

Creative Workshop Report

Rigid Heddle Loom Weaving

Age group: 14 - 24

Tutor: Mary-Ann Svenson

Description

Workshop to be held in a designated workshop space.

After introducing myself we will move onto weaving on the rigid heddle loom, giving a basic understanding of weaving.

Introduction to a 16 inch [41cm] loom previously warped so students can get started immediately, using commercial cones of wool as well as many handspun remnants of wool and alpaca.

Students will be shown basic "tabby" weave and then how to incorporate stripes in different colours and how to create loops in weft yarn, which are traditional weaving techniques. We then move onto Saori style weaving which is a Japanese weave where techniques include inserting fibre into the warp, making shadows in weave and adding a contrasting colour into the warp.

Morning tea and lunch were provided by local businesses.

Workshop ran over 1 ½ days on the 24th and 25th September 2020.

Students were able to take looms home to be able to finish warp length of 50 inches [127cm]

Program/Lesson Plan

I introduce myself and explain my history of weaving which is a 3 year certificate course through Tenterfield TAFE in all aspects of spinning, weaving, dyeing and design in 1993 – 1996. Weekend course at the Curiousweaver Studio in Saori weaving. I also showed students some examples of both traditional weaving and saori weaving.

Intro explaining warp and weft threads on the loom, where weft threads open when lifting the heddle up and down is called the "shed".

How to fill the shuttle with yarn using figure 8 winding, start to weave yarn from shuttle – leaving a tail to be inserted into next shed.

Introducing stripes with contrasting colour and how to pick up loops in weft yarn using a knitting needles. These are traditional weaving methods.

We move onto Saori weaving techniques, which is a more free form way of weaving.

Unspun fibre is inserted into the warp and woven in.

Shadowing is weaving yarn back and forth in a small block.

Adding a warp yarn in contrasting colour and weaving it in, then bunching yarn across warp and weaving in.

Clasped weft technique involving one weft yarn pulling a contrast weft yarn through warp threads.

In between using these techniques students continued "tabby" or plain weaving with a variegated wool yarn to create length for scarf.

Benefits to young people

Connecting with community and meeting people.

Feelings of wellbeing and confidence through achievement.

Learning new skills and associating with like minded people of similar ages.

Willing to take instruction from an experienced tutor.

Feeling pride in local opportunities in their town.

How to care for equipment and woven fabric.

Key Outcomes

Students learnt how to weave a length of cloth whilst creating interesting effects through various techniques.

Students also learnt to interact with others and tutor.

A feeling of achievement and a wearable piece of art cloth – scarf.

More techniques in both traditional and saori weaving.
